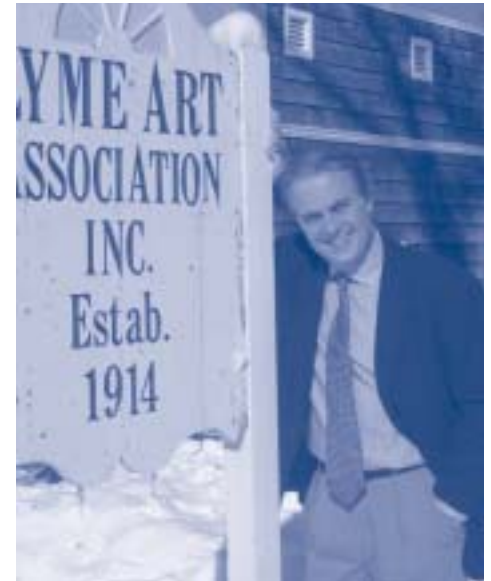

LAA Welcomes Docents from The Florence Griswold Museum

“Know ye, that I, Florence Griswold, of the Town of Old Lyme . . . for the consideration of One (\$1.00) Dollar . . . do give, grant, bargain, sell, and confirm unto the said Lyme Art Association a certain tract of land . . .” Miss Florence wrote that deed on November 23, 1917. The artists who boarded with her and who exhibited their works at the town library each summer now owned the piece of property where they would build a permanent art gallery to exhibit their work.

And so on January 19th, the LAA was delighted to welcome a group of Flogris docents to the gallery for a “meet and greet.” Linda Ahmert, a docent at Flogris, organized the presentation. On display were artifacts from the LAA archives including newspaper clippings, photographs, posters advertising the early shows (admission was 50 cents), china and ‘LAA’ monogrammed silverware. The docents could also read

a copy of the deed written in Miss Florence’s very legible handwriting. Linda pointed out the clause that guaranteed Miss Florence “the exclusive privilege of gathering ice on the pond.” The brook and pond, which is the dividing line between LAA and the Florence Griswold Museum, was once the source of Miss Florence’s refrigeration.

Miss Florence became the first manager of the LAA gallery and remained so until her death in 1937.

After learning about the historic connection between the two organizations, the docents were encouraged to share our story with their visitors and send them “across the bridge” to visit the Association as part of the Old Lyme art story and the continuing legacy of Miss Florence. The docents were invited to view the current exhibition and to join in an old LAA tradition—a tea party.

Award Winning Artist Burton Silverman to Jury Art of New England Summer Show

The LAA is honored to have Burton Silverman, one of America's foremost realist painters and portrait artists, as Juror for this year's *Art of*

New England Show. He has won 32 major awards from national exhibitions, including five awards from the National Academy of Design. He has had 26 one-man exhibitions and his works are in the permanent collections of the Brooklyn Museum, the Denver Art Museum, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the National Portrait Gallery, the National Museum of American Art, and the Butler Institute of American Art. He was elected in 1990 to the

Society of Illustrators' Hall of Fame, and in 1992 was one of only 3 electees to the Pastel Society Hall of Fame. He has been commissioned to paint portrait covers for *Time* magazine, portraits for the *New Yorker*, and has been featured in *Art News*, *International Artist*, *American Artist*, and *The Artist's Magazine*. In 1999, a major retrospective of his work was shown at the Butler Institute of American Art and the Brigham Young Museum in Utah.



It's with great excitement and anticipation that LAA welcomes the Plein-Air Painter's of America (PAPA) back to Old Lyme for another workshop and seminar scheduled for October 10–16, 2004. PAPA artist instructors will arrive a week prior to the workshop and paint en plein-air Connecticut scenes which will be on view and for sale at the Association Gallery from October 16–November 27. Non-attending PAPA members will also be sending work for exhibition and sales.

Founded in 1986, the Plein-Air Painters of America is a group of exceptional artists dedicated to the historic tradition of painting directly from life. PAPA exhibitions and sales are held from coast to coast, and eagerly attended by collectors of fine art.

Art Education for Students of All Ages and Skills

LAA members took advantage of an array of art classes and workshops this past fall. In addition to the wide range of classes for students of all skills and ages taught by LAA instructors, we also offered a two-day workshop with Boston's Craig Srebnik. The workshop focused on understanding and applying the techniques of painting skin tone and the figure. LAA hopes that Craig will return for a follow up session.

The LAA also hosted the Plein Air Painters of America 7th Annual Workshop. Twelve instructors and 133 students from across the United States and Canada convened at the LAA for lectures, critiques, demonstrations, and instruction in plein air painting. We look forward to PAPA returning to Old Lyme this October.

In January, Connecticut Plein Air Painter, Barbara Lussier, lead a brave trio out to paint the icy CT River and snow covered pastures of Ashlawn Farm. Barbara appropriately titled her workshop "White Out."

Lyme Academy College of Fine Arts Instructor and LAA Elected artist, Nancy Peel Gladwell, perfectly complemented the winter exhibition "Interiors" with her works and an informative lecture. She spoke in-depth about the history of painting interiors, which culminated in a session regarding her own works. More of Nancy's work is on display at the Academy in

'Potluck' Supper Artist Meeting—Food For Thought

“Helping improve communication and sharing ideas between all Artist Members at the LAA is an ongoing goal of APEC,” said Judy Chapman, an Elected Artist and APEC (Artistic Policies and Exhibitions Committee) Chairman, at the opening of this year’s first Potluck Supper Artists’ Meeting on January 21. “And of course having fun!” added Judy. Lively discussion was the order of the evening with a wide range of topics covered and suggestions made.

Participation and Volunteering:

President Jerry Litner kicked-off the meeting, emphasizing the importance of volunteerism by LAA members and the need for expanding the ranks of volunteers “and not just relying on the same core group to do everything. A volunteer organization should be fun, with a sense of team spirit.” One suggestion was that Receiving Day may be the best time to recruit volunteers. Bob Potter expressed the benefit of an effective process to manage the volunteers and the need for a team to take on the role of Volunteer Coordinators which Loretta Bernier has done so effectively over the years, but is now relinquishing.

Membership: It was suggested that the LAA hold a “Welcome Evening” for new students of the Academy each year, and offer a free or discounted student membership. Currently, LAA gives free membership to Academy graduates. Other ideas: create a *Lyme Arts Calendar* for tourists to promote Old Lyme as a major arts destination. Elin Larson suggested holding all-day seminars at the LAA with two or three lectures scheduled for an intensive art education event.

Guaranteed Number of Works and Hanging of Shows: After conversation with many Elected Artists, APEC has decided to increase the Elected Artists’ guaranteed number of works from one to two. Several new Associate Artist members present at the meeting expressed that “quality is key” and that our standards should remain high. It was said that artists have more places to show their work now and the LAA must “carve out its niche” and be known for high quality art shows.

Applying for Elected Artist Status:

Recommendations were made to better communicate the criteria used by the Screening Committee and it was decided that a letter will be written to clarify criteria for jurying work and sent to future applicants. One artist suggested we should make it a “big deal” when we have newly elected artists. She thinks they should be mentioned in the *NY Times*. Also more “mentoring of artists” offered by Elected Artists.

Entry Fees: It was discussed and agreed by the members present that we should increase the entry fees for shows to \$11 for Elected Artists and \$11 for the first entry/\$8 for each additional entry for Associate Artists. The increase would help cover the mounting costs of food and beverages for opening nights. This issue will be voted on at the Annual Spring Meeting on May 27th.

Jurying: Having a jury “foreman” was suggested, and also distributing a written criteria to guide the jurors would help improve the current jurying process. Lisa Horrigan suggested key criteria such as “original,

creatively strong, and competent works.” David Ward emphasized “the ability to design, compose, draw and model with proper perspective, and for painters to be adept at handling values, color, edges, and atmospheric qualities. Presentation should be a factor, so jurors need to consider the choice of mats, frames and hangers.” The foreman will remind jurors of key criteria, that their decision is final, and the goal of selecting approximately 200 works per show.

APEC will continue to work on written criteria for jurying, guidelines for applicants for Elected Artist status, and on reworking the Elected Artist application form. Everyone in attendance agreed holding future “potluck” dinners was a great way to meet members and discuss ideas.

LAA Awards Scholastic Gold Key Winner

For the past fifteen years, the Connecticut Art Education Association has sponsored the Connecticut Scholastic Art Awards competition and exhibition held at the Hartford Art School, University of Hartford.

The Connecticut Scholastic program is part of a national endeavor created in 1923 by Maurice R. Robinson, founder of Scholastic Inc., publisher of children's books and educational materials. The purpose was to "ensure that young people receive attention where they might otherwise be faced with indifference." Scholastic Art Awards have become the largest and longest-running program of its kind in the country. A National Awards ceremony follows at Carnegie Hall in June and then a month-long exhibition of finalists at the Corcoran Gallery, Washington, D.C. Past winners in art and writing have included some of America's most respected talents including Richard Avedon, Truman Capote, Frances Farmer, Joyce Maynard, Joyce Carol Oates, Robert Redford, and Andy Warhol.

The Lyme Art Association contributed a \$100 prize for the "Best in Traditional Drawing" for this event. This year LAA's Director Bob Potter presented the award to Gold Key recipient Natalia Torres, a 9th grade student at the Hotchkiss School in Lakeville at an awards ceremony at the Lincoln Theatre at the University of Hartford.

In presenting the award, Bob noted "Scholastic and these awards have both a personal and nostalgic appeal for me. My wife and son both won the Scholastic gold key when they were students and I started my career at Scholastic Magazines after art school. Our son continues the tradition, working at Scholastic Magazines in New York after his graduation from art school."

Other LAA connections: Associate Artist Jack Montmeat was one of the Scholastic jurors this year. Helen Barnett, LAA's publicist, serves on the Connecticut Art Education Association's Regional Advisory Board which organizes the event.

The Platt Capital Campaign

I am particularly excited to take on the Chairmanship of The Board of Trustees at a time when the Lyme Art Association and its new Director Bob Potter are immersed in plans to celebrate the building's architect, Charles A. Platt.

Charles Adams Platt (1861-1933) was a multi-talented artist who distinguished himself as an etcher, painter, landscape architect, and architect. He was, in the words of one critic, "a Twentieth Century Renaissance Man." Yet, his credentials as an architect cannot be challenged. Platt beat out Frank Lloyd Wright for the prestigious Harold McCormick house commission in 1908. He was equally successful in the design of public buildings including the Freer Gallery in Washington, DC, the Clark Wing for the Corcoran Galley of Art also in Washington, the Lyman Allyn Art Museum, the University of Illinois, and

Phillips Academy, Andover, MA.

Over the next eighteen months, the Lyme Art Association will embark on a capital campaign in Platt's name to improve our historic Lyme Street gallery and gardens that he designed in 1920 for the legendary Lyme summer art colony. The campaign, with a goal of \$200,000, will culminate in a gala opening and exhibition of Platt's paintings, etchings and architectural renderings in the fall of 2005.

I invite our members and interested readers of the newsletter to continue the tradition of generosity that Platt himself initiated when he donated \$16,170.26 and his services to the original members of the Lyme Art Association, by calling on all of our current Association members who are interested in preserving this important building to express their interest in support of the Platt Capital Campaign.



James B. Murphy, II is a playwright and journalist. In addition to chairing the Trustees of the Lyme Art Association, he is a member of the

Executive Committee of the O'Neill Theatre Center and has served on the boards of the Florence Griswold Museum and numerous other Shoreline arts organizations. He originated the Musical Masterworks chamber music series. A recent convert to the mysteries of figurative painting and drawing, he plans to follow in the footsteps of his great, great grandfather William Morris Hunt, a founder of the American Barbizon. He admires the artistic spirit of American Renaissance men and women.



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
